Goodbye & Good luck to TSSC Johannesburg Centre

It is time to say goodbye!

Some of you are aware that Cathi and I have recently made the decision to return to the UK. Cathi has been in the UK with Adam and Scott since the beginning of September 2015 to make sure that they start the new school year (Adam doesn't have long to go to his GCSEs). I wrapped everything (house, cars, money etc.) up by the end of October and I'm sitting here in Aldershot on my first day at work in the UK on the 9th November!

We have taken this decision for a variety of reasons and leaving South Africa was an incredibly tough decision and one that Cathi and I didn't take lightly. We have spent 24 years in total in this lovely country and 14 of them have been with our Triumph Stag. We were married here, our children were born here — we have immensely strong ties to the country even though both of us were born in the UK.

I met Cathi in Johannesburg in 1991 and took her back to the UK in 1994 when my three year



contract came to an end. However the lure was strong and I accepted another contract back here in 1997 and we have been here ever since. We were married in 1999 and I officially 'arrived' in 2001 when I became a permanent resident and imported my Stag from storage in the UK which I had acquired in 1995 during that 'break' back in the UK.

We have many, many memories of breakfast runs around the Magaliesberg area or down to the Vaal area and it is amazing that in that whole time we only visited one National Gathering and that was without the Stag in Port Edward in 2003 (I think). Over the years the Stag attended 6 annual concours events and won two Gold, two Silvers medals and one bronze medal. In the days before medals it came first in class for d'Etat as well (That was the concours at the Johannesburg Botanical Gardens way back!)

I also enjoyed my stint as regional secretary between 2006 and 2008. It's always nice to 'give back'.

My two boys Adam and Scott have grown up around Triumphs and they will have many happy memories of the various outings – I am grateful for that. In fact Adam, who is now 14, has told me that the Stag is his when I die. That's nice.

Unfortunately in recent years (actually since 2007 when we started a new company via a management buy-out) due to family and work commitments I have just been unable to participate in the Noggins, Breakfast Runs and Nationals and I regret that a lot. The priority unfortunately had to be family and work.

We will miss the many friends we have made – Mike Gilchrist, John Dobbins, John Crowther, Jean Coppens, Eddie Steele, Gino Casieri. Mark Hirst & Keith Kelly to name a few.

I sincerely hope to remain in touch in some way – perhaps the odd article for the newsletter or Sabrina (no promises!). I wish all the very best to TSCC Johannesburg Centre for the future and I am leaving South Africa with many happy memories of enjoying Triumph motoring in the sun.

Thank you all for making my Triumph time in South Africa very memorable. I'll leave you with a photo of the old girl with the hard top on in front of the Voortrekker monument taken on the 1st of November 2015 – the day before I drove her into a shipping container.

The kids were enjoying the sea and sand and I was lying in a leisurely fashion on the bed with my missis, Janine, enjoying the view of the warm Indian Ocean and habitually reading a 1990s Classic Car magazine edition about barn finds and the like. So my wife decides to add some spice to the occasion.....now before you get too excited....she pipes up and says: "Anne-Marie, the headmistress at the school, has one of those old cars you are reading about"! That was basically the end of my holiday at the seaside as all I could think of was to get back to Johannesburg to go and have a look at this mystery "old" car.
